# THE PROCESSION TO THE NEW PLACE OF WORSHIP

As the pilgrim people of God we now join in song.

At the turn of the century, Merritt was a little village in a far corner of the Diocese of New Westminster. The area was known as the Nicola Missionary District. The faithful members of the Church of England in Canada were eager to have a parish and a priest to minister to them. They had the corner of the streets we now know as Chapman and Granite Avenue. They proceeded to build a parish hall. The hall was ready for use in the fall of 1908, and on November 8<sup>th</sup> of that same year the Parish of Saint Michael's was formed.

The first parish priest was the Rev. Thomas Walker. He was appointed and arrived preaching his first sermon on the first Sunday of august, 1910. He lived in the area known as Lower Nicola and rode his bicycle to church. In 1911, while riding to Merritt he was seriously injured and died shortly afterwards.

The first Wardens of the new parish were Dr. George Henry Tuthill, Vicar's Warden and Mr. H. Cleasby, People's Warden.

Bishop A.U. de Pencier of New Westminster then appointed the Rev. J. Thompson, Vicar of Nicola, to St. Michael's and the first Confirmation service was held on Sunday, May 4<sup>th</sup>, 1913 in the parish hall. On July 12<sup>th</sup>, 1913, the Bishop laid the cornerstone for the new church to be erected at the left of the parish hall. The building was finished and opened by the Venerable Archdeacon Heathcote on October 19<sup>th</sup>, 1913, beginning the long history of the parish of St. Michael's.

During the winter of 1917-18, it was so cold the church could not be used and the vicar erected a portable altar in the parish hall, where services again took place. On Whitsunday a Memorial Cross was consecrated by Bishop de Pencier – a gift from the wife of the Rev. N. J. Thompson, vicar, in memory of her family, the Whittakers. Upon the decision of the Bishop of New Westminster, the Rural Deanery of Ashcroft, Kamloops and northern parishes were to become a new diocese. The completion of the Canadian Pacific Railroad had a great bearing on this issue.

The new Diocese of Cariboo came into being at a Synod held at St. Alban the Martyr parish, Ashcroft, B.C. on October 28<sup>th</sup>, 1914. Merritt parish then became a parish of the new Diocese of Cariboo.

The church was debt-free by 1928 and on January 14th the building was solemnly consecrated by Bishop Walter Adams under the dedication of St. Michael's.

During the height of the Depression the parish could not raise the parish apportionment of \$240.00 as the village was so devastated by hard times. Later on, during the latter part of the War Years, the Chancel was added. Many gifts were received – fair linen, beautifully hand embroidered; alms basin and offertory plates were given and dedicated. On Remembrance Day, 1944 the Honour Roll was unveiled. October 1948 arrived and the church and hall were recipients of two new sawdust burners. A new vicarage was badly needed but all efforts seemed to fail. It was not until the incumbency of the Rev. Nelson Atkinson the present parish house was erected at 2015 Cleasby Street, the street named after the Cleasby family who were among the early Anglicans to the area.

For a few years during the 1970s and up to 1985 there were two priests serving the Anglicans of the Nicola Valley. One was for the Merritt Parish and the other was for the Shulus Indian Mission which served the parishes of five Indian Reserves. In 1985, lack of money necessitated some changes to the nature of the ministry provided by St. Michael's Church. There would only be one priest serving the area. This area included the parish of St. John the Baptist at Nicola; St. Michael's, Merritt; All Saint's, Shulus; St. Philip's, Canford; and St. Catherine's, Shackan.

The priest would be assisted by lay people who had received special training in conducting services. Since 1978, certain parishioners had been licensed to conduct the services of morning and evening prayer when a priest was not available, and to administer the chalice at Holy Communion services. In 1985, from the group of people, two people from St. Michael's and two people from Shulus received further training and were licensed by the Bishop as Eucharistic Ministers, to conduct services of Holy Communion, administering the Reserve Sacrament, that is, bread and wine which have been consecrated at a previous service and carefully stored in a special cupboard called an Aumbrey, which is located near the altar. The materials for the Aumbrey in St. Michael's Church were given as a memorial gift by the priest at the time and his wife, Rev. Adrian and Mrs. Freda Voysey. The Aumbrey was crafted from wood by Craig Fairley, one of the Eucharistic Ministers.

At the present (1986), St. Michael's Church is served by a dedicated parish council, two A.C.W. groups, an Altar guild and a Sunday school. There are regular joint activities at which people from all the churches in the Nicola Valley Pastoral District come together for worship and fellowship.
