# An Epiphany Message from Archbishop Lynne...

Eve of Epiphany, 2022

Dear People of the Territory of the People,



Greetings on this twelfth day of the Christmas Season, the Eve of Epiphany. I am always glad that Christmas is a season in our church calendar, not just one day but twelve days to celebrate the birth of Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us. We need so much to absorb this good news that the God we worship knows the reality and vulnerability of being human; God is not a remote disinterested architect of the universe, but a passionately engaged Lover of Creation who is prepared to dwell with humanity.

This is such an important foundation for our prayer life, to carry on in depth, honest conversation with God about the reality of our lives, and to leave space for listening to God. We enter this conversation knowing we are deeply understood in our full humanity, the comforting confidence of being fully known; this is the Good News of Christmas. How does that affect your daily life?

I know the high cost of having only on-line worship during this season, as much of our joy in the season is being with people, singing together, being surrounded with familiar sights, sounds, smells, that we associate with Christmas. I pray you have been able to deepen your spiritual practices of the season in your own home to add fullness to the on-line worship. As Incarnational people, as we have discovered during the pandemic, it is important to physically partake: to light a candle, to stand up to sing along, maybe even to dress up for worship, to read along in your own Bible, to participate as much as possible with our bodies and whole selves so we are worshipping, not just passively watching. I invite you to light the Christ candle of your Advent Wreath one last time tomorrow, on Epiphany, to mark the end of the Christmas season. Pray the Epiphany Collect (below). Leave your lights up for Epiphany season!

With the extremely cold weather and the amount of snow we have had across the province, closures, coupled with the Omicron cases rising, many of us have been housebound. We have had disappointing and frustrating limitations to our usual Christmas traditions, family visits and travel plans canceled. This has called us once again to draw on spiritual strength and deep patience, to find inner resources to deal with isolation, loneliness, restlessness, disappointment and uncertainty.

One of the ongoing discoveries of a maturing Christian, (sanctification, as it is called, our growing in holiness) is that joy is not tied to outward circumstances but to the faithfulness of God. We have been reminded of that in the past few days as we have reviewed the remarkable life of Archbishop Desmond Tutu. In the midst of the trauma of Apartheid, in the difficult work of listening to horror stories during the Truth and Reconciliation hearings, he maintained a sense of joy in God's presence with humanity. May we grow in that joy based on God's love. As we enter the season of Epiphany, the growing Light of Christ spreading out to the world, I invite you to memorize and meditate on Tutu's conviction:

"Goodness is stronger than evil love is stronger than hate Light is stronger than darkness, Life is stronger than death.

Victory is ours, through God who loves us."

Thank you to all the clergy and lay leaders who made worship happen over the Christmas Season. It was a joy for me to share Dec. 26 worship with Kootenay Diocese and Territory of the People together.

Please pray for Bishop-Elect Kathy Martin, who will be consecrated on Epiphany as the Bishop of B.C. Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada. I had planned to attend this event in person, but it has been scaled down to only a handful of participants; I will be now attending and reading on Zoom. I'm sad to not be there, but two other Anglican bishops will be there in person; it is an important symbol of being in full communion with the Lutherans for Anglican bishops to lay hands on Lutheran bishops at their consecrations and vice versa.

Next week we will be reviewing the need for on-line worship. In the meantime, please continue to phone each other, especially any isolated members of your church community.

EVILTON Fire Fund – donations are still being received providing financial aid to the community which was devastated by fire on June 30th, 2021. BC Disaster Fund – renamed the Nicola Valley Flood Fund: ~ The residents of BC are still experiencing the results of the disaster from the Atmospheric River which caused flooding and mudslides, damaged highways, impacted rail lines and supply chains, destroyed homes and businesses, and forced hundreds of residents to evacuate. Now with winter upon us, colder temperatures, snow and freezing rain, the clean-up and repair is difficult and will take time. In the Territory, our people of Merritt who have been so severely affected by the floods are facing a tough winter and need help. The response from the wider Anglican church has been immediate, with many answering the call yet again with offers to send money to those who are impacted, and those affected and displaced.

The Territory of the People has set up a "Nicola Valley Flood Fund" to distribute funds collected to those affected in the Territory.

## Territory News, continued...

The Territory Coordinating Council met on November 20<sup>th</sup> where a long and serious discussion took place with Archbishop Lynne McNaughton, our Metropolitan and current presiding bishop about whether or not the Territory is ready to proceed with an episcopal electoral assembly in 2022. As a result of this discussion, Coordinating Council passed the following motion which was carried unanimously:

#### BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

Coordinating Council direct Archbishop Lynne McNaughton to appoint an Assistant Bishop as an interim until the election of a new bishop for the Territory of the People

The rationale for this decision is to give us all time and space to recover and heal. The leadership of a seasoned, retired Bishop can lead us through this process of recovery until we feel the time is right to proceed with an election for a new bishop. With fewer people in leadership roles to deal with some of the challenges we are facing, having an Assistant Bishop in place for the short term will give us all some breathing room, will remove the time constraints and immediacy for the Electoral Committee, for the delegates and for us all; it will give us time to continue the process of an election at a later date without these time constraints. The feeling from many is we need to be diligent in the election process and not feel rushed in any way.

The assistant Bishop will work with Archbishop Lynne in the leadership of the Territory, and it must be stressed, **this is for the short term only**, until such time as we all feel ready to proceed with an episcopal electoral assembly. Archbishop Lynne will keep us informed about her search for a retired Bishop who is suitable to the needs of the Territory.

- Assembly 2022 Coordinating Council has set the date for a full Assembly next year, so please mark your calendars for May 27-29, 2022. The Assembly will likely be held in Kamloops; more details will unfold in the coming months.
- Policy Revisions Coordinating Council approved the increase to travel rates for parish mileage from .43 to .45 cents/kilometer, effective January 1, 2022. Next review will be in 2023.
- Territory Resource Centre: After setting up and running the Resource Centre for many years, Coordinators Gordon and Mary Dove have decided to retire. We are so grateful for their ministry and the riches it has brought to the Territory. Mary and Gordon have earned a well deserved break! The Territory is looking for one or two people to take over the ministry of the Resource Centre. Policy 1.12 Mandate of the Resource Centre will provide an overview.
